


Our Employment Team

1,903 total employment intakes

838 clients attained stable employment

Invested \$216,000 on skills upgrade training for local employers through Canada Ontario Job Grant

Work Readiness Awareness Program (WRAP) met intake targets, exceeded workshop completion goals, and hit 98% of placement targets











Cause for Celebration

Our WRAP program was honoured with the Innovation Award from First Work, as a creative and inspiring service model.





Our Housing Team



Emergency Shelter Intake Services launched in January and supported over 665 people in the first three months of operations

The Housing Resource Centre launched in February and served 463 clients in the first two months

Station and Cornerstone House supported 378 youth in our Shelter Programs, an increase of 181 youth compared to last year

Cornerstone Transitional Housing Program supported 58 clients

Supportive Housing programs helped 203 people find stable housing

A pilot of evidence-informed shelter diversion has achieved a 30% successful diversion rate, increasing shelter bed availability in the community



A client and their infant child came to the Housing Resource Centre to secure housing. They were receiving social assistance and struggling to secure a home due to their limited income. The client accessed the motel program and was connected to the Tax Clinic, Brant Access to Housing, and Supportive Housing. Despite barriers, they worked on their goals and were successfully housed in a 2-bedroom unit through the Supportive Housing program.






Financial Report

Year ended March 31, 2024 SOAR's revenue totaled \$16,767,276, reflecting a 10.7% increase over the previous fiscal year. Performance-based funding in the employment sector contributed to the surplus, which has been reinvested in programs for this fiscal year. SOAR is proud to work with funders from all levels of government, and its positive financial position underscores the organization's effective management and operational efficiency throughout the year.
